2023 Plant Sale News

It's not too early to start planning your 2023 native gardens and projects. The plant sale committee has had one of many meetings and made an initial list of native plants to meet the needs of native plant enthusiasts – whether you are just beginning, need to fill in some spaces, or have a large project to tackle.

Native plant vendors begin to plant seeds for the upcoming year in the fall based, in part, on customer orders. We select our plants based on previous plant sales and those species that will thrive in a range of environments. We welcome orders of any size, but if you are planning on ordering large quantities of one species (for example, 25 Prairie dropseed or one full flat of Wild petunia, etc.), please let us know so we can plan to have those plants available for you. Please note that although we order our plants early, we have no control over crop failure, which is when weather and other conditions occur that could reduce or eliminate part of the order.

Mark your calendars now for the 2023 Native Plant Sale! The order deadline is Friday, April 28, 2023, followed by a members-only pick up and sale on Thursday, May 11, and the regular sale and pick-up on Friday, May 12 and Saturday, May 13. Annual Meeting & Seed Exchange

The annual meeting of WORRV chapter will be held at Rock Valley College on Thursday, November 17th starting at 7:00 p.m. We will have reports from our officers and a special program by Rob Clark about his year-long effort to visit all 44 of the Forest Preserves of Winnebago County during the centennial year of the Forest Preserve District. We will also have our seed exchange starting at 6:00 p.m. Information about preparing and packaging your seeds is below. We will have hors d'oeuvres and other treats prior to the meeting, so come early!

Collect seeds from native plants in your yard or landscape project. If possible, separate the seeds/seed heads from the excess plant material and put single-species seeds in their own envelopes, baggies, or paper bags (lunch bags work great). Add a label with both the common name and scientific name (check online or in a seed catalog), place of origin (e.g. Winnebago County, Wild Ones plant sale, or another source), and your name (in case anyone has questions, such as "how does the plant grow?"). We often have lots of seeds so if you are new to this and don't have any seeds to share, you are still welcome to join us and take seeds home. Sharing seeds increases the opportunity for more native plants to grow in our communities. Come help us celebrate another successful year of native landscaping!

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October Program Recap: Bats - Reyond the Myths Jerry Paulson

Bats represent one quarter of all mammal species on earth yet they are widely misunderstood and persecuted. Barbara Williams asked us to look past our prejudices to see that bats are inextricably linked to the health of our environment and our agricultural systems. Globally, they consume huge

quantities of crop pests and provide pollination services worth billions of dollars. Locally, bats are busily at work on mosquito control and crop pest reduction and they ask nothing more than to be left alone to do their work.

Bats are not blind, are not flying rodents, and will not attack people or get in your hair! A quarter of all mammals are bats, second only to rodents. Many predators eat bats, while bats consume millions of insects and spread seeds of many trees, cactus, and other plants. They pollinate agave, some giant cactus flowers, bananas, and a long list of other fruit trees.

Many species of bats have evolved fleshy structures on their faces to echolocate their prey and avoid flying into obstacles in the dark.

Northern Illinois has ten species of bats: Big brown

bat, Silver-haired bat, Eastern red bat, Hoary bat, Little brown bat, Tri-colored bat and Evening bat are the most common. The Grey bat, Indiana bat and Northern long-eared bat are rare or endangered species. Most species roost in trees or crevices in old barns or buildings.

Barbara explained the risks and benefits of welcoming bats to your landscape and ways to accommodate and encourage bats without conflict. She also gave a brief demonstration of a bat detection microphone and recorder that can be used to monitor bat populations.
