We are pleased to welcome back Ed Cope to speak to our chapter. His past presentations have been excellent and well received. The Restoration Ecologist for the Natural Land Institute, Ed will discuss the do's and don'ts of seed processing, storage, and propagation. Learn about the best ways to keep your seed viable over the winter months. and how to get the most out of it come springtime. In-depth tutorials will be provided on do-it-yourself propagation techniques, including seed stratification and scarification. We will also discuss how to choose the right growing medium for native plants.

Ed received a Bachelor of Science degree in wildlife and habitat management and land rehabilitation in 2013 from Montana State University. After graduation, he spent a year in Alaska working for a dog-

sled team. He says, "There's a lot of good work to be done there. I've spent time (out west), but their point of view (on the environment) is so different. There's still so much land left. There's not so much here."

A hearty thank-you to Jodell and Marty for your hard work! The chapter and the environment are grateful.

The prairie plant sale was chaired for the past two years **Rick Freiman**. He will be missed in that role, as well as in the chapter as a whole, as he has retired and moved out of the area. His hard work on the sale meant that over 2,700 native plants were planted in local prairies and savannas. And of course funds were raised that enable the chapter to fund its educational programs and activities. Taking over at the helm for the 2017 sale will be **Cynthia Chmell** and **Bobbie Lambiotte**. They combine computer skills (for order processing) and tremendous knowledge of native plants, and great enthusiasm for the task before them. Claudia Fleeman has served admirably as the show me/help me coordinator for the past two years, having taken over for Mary Anne Mathwich and Anita Johnson. It takes a keen sense of organization (and local geography!) to organize these multi-stop, travelling landscape tours, and Claudia has been very successful in balancing the "show me" and "help me" components. Indeed, the several events each year are consistently very well attended. A tip of the hat to Claudia for a job well done!

The coming year will see a slight alteration of past events and shifting of titles. Instead of numerous show me/help me events, the plan is to have just one show me/help me event (likely in June). However, this year will see the chapter's second annual lecture and natural landscape tour, all being coordinated by the talented Mary Anne Mathwich (and her hard-working committee). You will be hearing much more about this event in coming months. The essential facts are that the lecture will be on Thursday, July 13 (the second Thursday, rather than the usual third Thursday of the month on which our monthly meetings are held). The landscape tour will be the following weekend, Saturday and Sunday, July 15 and 16 (in typical "garden walk" format, with a map and description of locations, and the ability for folks to pick and choose which ones to visit at their own pace).

The committee has already scouted out and secured many beautiful landscapes for the tour, and the presenter has committed for the lecture. We will be counting on chapter members to help spread the word about this event at the least, and, for those so inclined, to volunteer on any or all of the three days. Many hands will be needed

to pull off an event of this magnitude. A big thank-you to Mary Anne and her committee for the hard work already done, and that still to be done going forward.

Finally, how to begin to thank **Janet Giesen** for her eight years of service to the chapter as treasurer? I still remember tagging up with another board member to corner Janet at the tree sale pickup day at the Discovery Center parking lot in Rockford (some of you chapter old-timers might member that location), asking her to consider being our treasurer. In addition to keeping meticulous records (the checkbook always balanced to the penny in her monthly reconciliations), she helped to bring a greater sense of organization to the chapter's books. - We held a board retreat during February to discuss new ideas and make plans for the future.
- There were eight excellent presentations at our monthly meetings at Rock Valley College by experts in their fields, plus an inspiring video featuring the wisdom of Doug Tallamy.
- We had three very successful plant sales, namely the woodland, prairie, and tree and shrub sales.
- To improve our visibility and name recognition, as well as to spread the word about natives, our display booth made an appearance at five outside events across northern Illinois.
- We participated in the second Nature
 Fiesta, organized by the Forest Preserves of
 Winnebago County. This is a well attended
 nature event largely directed toward the
 Hispanic community.
- There were two well planned and executed show me/help me events.
- There were four plant rescues. In addition, five plant-sharing opportunities were organized, helping 200-250 (est.) native plants find new homes in other members' landscapes.
- We made the move to a new meeting room in the PE Center at Rock Valley College. The
