Why Plant Native Plant Species?

A native plant species is one that occurs naturally in a particular region, ecosystem, and/or habitat. The plants offered in this brochure are indigenous to Winnebago and surrounding counties. They evolved over thousands of years to survive in our weather extremes and local soils, in harmony with other native flora and fauna. Once established, native species require only occasional maintenance—no fertilizers, no pesticides or herbicides, and minimal watering (after they have become established).

The native birds, butterflies, bees, and mammals that evolved with native plants depend on them for food and shelter. Native plants also serve as host plants for new generations of beneficial butterflies and insects. Nonnative plants usually do not meet these needs. Even cultivars of native plants, which are bred to please humans, often lose their ability to sustain wildlife; the resulting decrease in genetic diversity impairs their ability to adapt for future survival.

This sale is ideal for those new to landscaping with native plants as well as experienced native plant gardeners. Most of the species offered here are easy to grow and will provide years of beauty while helping the environment. We recommend incorporating natives into your existing flower beds—mixed right in with other perennials. Or, create new beds of native plant species for a greater environmental impact.

How to Choose Your Plants

In order for native plant species to survive, it is important to match the plant requirements with your site's features. Some species have very specific requirements, while others can adapt to a wider range of environments. Water and light requirements can vary; young plants may need more attention to watering and encroaching plants than those that are mature.

In a naturalistic setting, having a diversity of species will provide a full range of color and bloom times. Even in a smaller setting, careful choices will result in the continuous color and harmony considered desirable in both natural and traditional landscapes. Planting three or more of the same species in one area allows for drifts of color, texture, and interest throughout the seasons and helps to attract more pollinators.

We highly recommend that you choose plants that will best thrive in your soil, moisture, and sunlight conditions. The information in this brochure lists the best soil conditions and sun exposure for each species (although some species can survive in a wide range of environments). See the "Growing Conditions Guide" in this brochure.

Shade (SH) Varies from light shade to dense shade with little or no direct sun.						
Part Shade (PS) Some direct sun. Less intense early morning or late afternoon sun.						
Full Sun (S) Six hours or more of unfiltered sun.						
RANGE OF SOIL MOISTURE						
Dry (D) Excessively drained. Usually sandy or gravely soil.						
Dry Mesic (DM) Medium dry. Well-drained but retains some moisture.						
Mesic (M) Medium moist. Average garden soil.						
Wet Mesic (WM)	Medium moist to soggy most of the year.					
Wet (W) Soggy or marshy most of the year.

Did You Know?

- Antennaria plantaginifolia (Pussytoes #3) is a host plant for the American Lady butterfly. Since this butterfly tends to lay eggs heavily once they find these plants, please plant plenty.
- Hydrophyllum virginianum (Virginia Waterleaf #26) provides early pollen for queen bumblebees searching to provide for a new colony.
- Schizachyrium scoparium (Little Bluestem #44) is a host plant for several skipper butterflies.
- Scrophularia marilandica (Late Figwort #45) carries a rich abundance of nectar in the tiniest of flowers which attracts humming-birds, myriad bees, and other insects. The stems also provide a winter home for insects; leave standing over winter.
- *Viola pedatifida* (Prairie Violet #54), once common on prairies, is a host plant for fritillary butterflies. Plant in spots where they won't be stepped on.
- Birds rely on berries and caterpillars to feed their young. Native dogwoods, viburnums, and serviceberries provide berries and are host plants for caterpillars which are eaten by robins, cardinals, catbirds, and other birds. Think tree and shrub sale!
- Planting native plants instead of non-native grass will help create beneficial habitat across the country.
- Wild Ones will also be selling plants at Nicholas Conservatory on Mother's Day and the Klehm Garden Fair June 3 and 4.

Placing Your Order, Potential Crop Failure, and Plant Availability

Plants in this brochure were selected at the end of 2022 based on vendor inventory and projected expectations for the new year. Weather and other growing conditions can affect the availability of plants.

Choice of plant substitution or refund will be available only in the event of shortages. Native plant species not listed in this brochure will also be available for substitution and sale at the pickup location.

IMPORTANT: Order early as supplies are limited! Orders will be filled in the order in which they are received. Orders placed late

may not be filled due to the limited number of plants.

Plant Health

We make every effort to ensure the plants that you receive are healthy at the time of pickup. Wild Ones Rock River Valley Chapter cannot guarantee plant materials after they leave our possession. New plants, especially plugs, should be planted and watered soon after purchase. Some plants may need extra care, as well as protection from wildlife, until they have become established.

Creating Your Own Native Garden

The following points are from the Wild Ones publication, *Creating Your Own Native Garden: A Guide to Creating Beautiful Home Landscapes, available at* https://nativegardendesigns.wildones.org

- 1. **Study your site** taking note of sun, shade, soil type, drainage and soil moisture.
- 2. **Map out your space.** Mark all existing plants currently on your site.
- 3. Study your neighborhood and consider what design elements would look great in your community.
- 4. Research designs you love. Get inspiration from other garden designs specific to your region.
- 5. **Design with the right plant** in the right place.
- 6. **Leave enough room for plants** to reach their mature size.
- 7. **Create a focal point** to draw your eye through your garden.
- 8. Add water features like birdbaths or small fountains to add interest and attract wildlife to your landscape.
- 9. **Group plants together** for visual impact. Plant in groups of odd numbers with a minimum of three of each species. In each area, choose 3 to 5 species in broad drifts that repeat throughout the planting area.
- 10. Use a mixture of textures with fine, bolder foliage, and tall fine-textured grasses as a frame behind lower rounded perennials.
- 11. Keep plants in scale. Maximum plant height should be half the width of your bed.
- 12. Choose plants to ensure blooms and foliage provide interest in all seasons.
- 13. Give your planting bed a clean edge to serve as a frame that accents your planting.
- 14. Consider your budget. Review the time and money you have available for installation and maintenance.
